

# THE FIVE STATES OF THE MIND

#### SADHGURU ISHA FOUNDATION

Sadhguru: Your mind can be in five different states. It could be inert. That means it is not activated at all, it is in a rudimentary state. If you energize it, then the mind becomes active but scattered. If you energize it further, it is no longer scattered but it is oscillating. If you energize it further, it becomes one-pointed. If you energize it still further, it will become conscious. If your mind is conscious, it is magic; it is a miracle, it is the bridge to the beyond.

Inert minds are not a problem. Someone who is very simple-minded and whose intellect is still not effervescent has no trouble. He eats well, he sleeps well. It is only people who can think, who cannot sleep. Simple-minded people perform all the activities of the body far better than the so-called intellectual people. There is a certain peace in it because you need some intelligence to cause disturbance and chaos. It is scattered intelligent minds which are disturbed and chaotic within themselves. But an inert mind is closer to animal nature than the possibility of what it means to be human.

So inert minds are one way, but the moment

you pump in some energy, it becomes active but it could be scattered. For a lot of people, after they come to the yoga programs, they become much more disturbed than before. They were sleeping and eating better before they came to yoga. Now their mind is thinking all kinds of things. They were never troubled by such things before because the mind was inert.

Once you start doing spiritual practices, the mind becomes effervescent, and it could become a scattered mind. Those who had a very scattered mind, they have come to a place where the mind is not so scattered, but it is oscillating - one day this way, another day that way. This is a huge improvement over being scattered moment to moment in ten different places.

If the mind was already an oscillating mind, and you energize it further, then slowly the mind becomes one-pointed. That is far better, but the most important thing is, the mind should become a conscious process. If it becomes a conscious process, the most miraculous thing in this existence is the human mind. In terms of instruments, it is

not your computer, car or spacecraft, but the human mind which is the most miraculous thing. This is the most miraculous thing to happen if only you could use it consciously.

The reason why for one person success comes so easy and naturally, while for another it is a struggle is because one person thinks the way he wants to and another thinks against himself. There is a beautiful story in the yogic lore.

A man went for a walk and accidentally walked into paradise. After the long walk he felt a little tired and thought, "I wish I could rest somewhere." He saw a nice beautiful tree beneath which there was wonderful soft grass. So he went and slept on the grass. After a few hours, he woke up well rested. Then he thought, "Oh! I am hungry. I wish I had something to eat." He thought of all the nice things he wanted to eat and all of them just appeared in front of him.

After he had the sumptuous food, the man thought, "Oh! I am thirsty, I wish I had something to drink." He thought of all the drinks he wanted to drink and all of them appeared in front of him.



In yoga, the human mind is referred to as markata or the monkey because of its wandering nature. The word monkey has also become synonymous with imitation. If you say you are monkeying somebody, it means imitating someone - this is the full-time job of your mind.

So an unestablished mind is referred to as a monkey. When this "monkey" became active in the man who went to paradise, he thought, "What the hell is happening here? I asked for food, food came. I asked for drink, drink came. Maybe there are ghosts around." He looked and there were ghosts. The moment he saw them he got terrified, he said, "Oh there are ghosts around here, maybe they will torture me." And the ghosts started torturing him, and he started screaming and yelling in pain. He said, "Oh these ghosts are torturing me, they are going to kill me." And he died.

The problem was he was sitting under a wishing tree or a Kalpavriksha. Whatever he asked for became a reality. You are also constantly sitting under a Kalpavriksha. A well-established human mind is referred to as a Kalpavriksha. In this mind, whatever you ask for becomes a reality. You need to develop the mind to a point where it becomes a Kalpavriksha, not a source of madness.

Once your mind gets organized, the way you think is the way you feel so your emotion will also get organized. Once your thought and emotion are organized, your energies will get organized in the same direction. Once your thought, emotion and energies are organized, your very body will get organized. Once all these four are organized in one direction, your ability to create and manifest what you want is phenomenal.





# EUGENIO CHACARRA

#### BECOMES FIRST SPANISH WINNER OF HERO INDIAN OPEN

LAST YEAR'S CHAMPION NAKAJIMA FINISHES 2ND; AHLAWAT, BHULLAR, CHOUHAN BEST INDIANS T-17


ugenio Chacarra of Spain, opened the final day with a double bogey and closed with a bogey-par to emerge as the 2025 Hero Indian Open on the DP World Tour. The 25-year-old, who came into the tournament

25-year-old, who came into the tournament on a special invite from Hero MotoCorp, became the first Spanish champion of the event, producing three under par rounds over four days.

Chacarra, who registered his first win on the DP World Tour, started the week with a win in the Hero Pro-Am, and went on to shoot 70-70-73-71 for a total 4-under 284 at the DLF Golf and Country Club. He won by two shots over the defending champion, Japan's Keita Nakajima (72).

The winner, Chacarra, who received the glittering and iconic Hero Indian Open trophy from Dr Pawan Munjal, Executive Chairman, Hero MotoCorp, also received











a winner's cheque of US \$ 382,500 while Nakajima received US\$ 247,500.

The top Indian was once again Veer Ahlawat (75) alongside Om Prakash Chouhan (71) and Gaganjeet Bhullar (73), who finished with a bogey and a double bogey in the last three holes to drop from T-10 to T-17.

Other Indian finishers were Ajeetesh Sandhu (78) at T-31, Shubhankar Sharma (75) at T-43rd, Shaurya Bhattacharya (79) at T-54 and Shiv Kapur (83) at T-60 alongside Kshitij Naveed Kaul (75).

Chacarra's maiden DP World Tour win came on just his ninth appearance as he bounced back from a disastrous start in the final round as he went 3-over after three holes and lost his overnight lead.

The highlight of Chacarra's round came at the 14th, where his chip, travelling at great speed from a tricky spot in the rough ran straight into the hole for a bonus birdie instead of racing well past.

Chacarra also made a number of crucial par



saves to maintain the distance between him and the chasing pack.

bogeys in the first three holes and then went through 11 pars before finishing birdies on the 15th and 18th for a round of even par 72 to finish runner-up for the second time in as many weeks. He was also the runner-up at the Singapore Classic last week on the DP World Tour.


Mexico's Carlos Ortiz held off Patrick Reed to claim the International Series Macau presented by Wynn, after a closely fought battle between the LIV Golf stars at Macau Golf and Country Club.

Ortiz won the International Series Oman last year and made it win number two on The International Series and Asian Tour after closing with a six-under-par 64 to finish three ahead of Reed on 22-under. Reed, fired a 67, as did fellow-American Jason Kokrak, three back in third. Sergio Garcia finished one stroke behind in fourth, following a 65.

It's the 10th win of Ortiz's career. He's also claimed one title a piece on the LIV Golf League and the PGA Tour. The 33-year-old moves to the top of the Asian Tour Order of Merit and The International Series rankings.

He has played in The Open once before, in 2021, while it will be the 10th time Reed has played in game's oldest Major, and the fifth for Kokrak.

Defending champion John Catlin from the United States returned a 68 to finish in a tie for 26th.



#### CHAN CLINCHES VICTORY IN EPIC LEXUS CHALLENGE FINALE

Aidric Chan of the Philippines clinched his first win on the Asian Development Tour in a spirited contest against countryman Juvic Pagunsan as the pair battled for victory in the final round of the Lexus Challenge in Vietnam.

Disaster almost struck for Chan on the 12th hole when a double bogey threatened to derail his bid but he recovered well with a hole-out eagle two holes later. By that stage, his playing partner Pagunsan had taken the lead, as three dropped shots by the leaders had wiped out their advantage for the day.

Bogeys by Pagunsan on holes 13 and 14 gave Chan a single shot advantage, although he gave that back with a bogey on 15, leaving the pair one stroke behind the leaders as they stepped up to the tee on the par five 16th.

Both birdied the next two holes, leaving them all tied for the lead as they made their way for a total of 205down the 18th, where Chan clinched their personal battle with a par against Pagunsan's bogey, taking the clubhouse lead on eight under.

Chan's victory pushes him into third in the ADT Order Of Merit, behind Pagunsan in second and leader Tawit Polthai who won the opening event of the season – the PKNS



Selangor Masters – in January. Pakistan's Ahmad Baig, who won on home soil at the

# HOW TO ENSURE CONSISTENCY LIKE XANDER SCHAUFFELE











#### INTRODUCTION

American Xander Schauffele is one of the most consistent ballstrikers on the PGA TOUR. Last season, he ranked 10th in Strokes Gained: Off the Tee and 6th in Approach the Green en route to a strong 2024 campaign where he won two major championships. We will examine his golf swing in this month's tutorial and break down the fundamentals that have made Schauffele one of the top players in the world.

#### Photo 1

Xander has a balanced set up with the back of

his right arm, front of right knee and middle of right foot vertically aligned. Sets his left hand on the club first, then attaches his right hand to get the right arm below the left and sets his shoulders square.

#### Photo 2

His take-away sees his hands, arms, and club creating a wide and powerful arc.

Here, the club shaft is parallel to the target line and when the shaft is parallel to the ground, it indicates an on-plane takeaway. The club

face matches his spine angle, showing no manipulation with the hands during his takeaway.

#### Photo 4

The upper body continues to rotate while he keeps the arms in front of his chest so the hands can have a straight delivery line to the inside of the ball on the down swing.

#### Photo 5

His elbows remain close together to provide a solid structure at the top of the swing.



#### Photo 6

Xander is fully loaded here, with a full upper body rotation against a stable lower body to produce full coil at the top of his back swing. The left wrist is slightly bowed to match the club face to the left forearm (square club face) which helps create a stable left wrist at impact.

#### Photo 7

His lower body starts the downswing to produce an inside out delivery to the ball. Xander maintains the angle between the left arm and club shaft which stores the power for a sequenced release.

#### Photo 8

The hips are more open than the upper body here, illustrating proper kinematic sequence (lower body, chest, arms, hands and club). The club face is looking at the ball with the right elbow on the right hip, right arm inside and behind left to keep the club face from over rotating.

#### Photo 9

His right elbow drives forward to move his hands and club head through the ball and prevents the club head from passing the left arm too early. The right shoulder stays down and behind the strike which creates a lot of compression between the club head and the ball.

#### Photo 10

You will notice his lower body is fully rotated with right hip and knee rotated up to the ball. His left foot stays down and right heel up which illustrates the weight transfer from the right side to the left during the downswing. Xander maintains his spine angle and releases on plane with the club and right arm bisecting his shoulder plane.

#### Photo 11

The momentum of the swing freely extends his arms and club up and around his body. He

watches the ball after impact with his eyes in a vertical plane staying in the shot well after impact.

#### Photo 12

Fully releases his lower body, upper body, arms, hands and club into a relaxed balanced finish. His spine angle has decreased as the force of the swing brings the upper body on top of the left leg. Now following the ball with his eyes in a horizonal position.

Spend some time to study these key positions that Xander Schauffele has in his golf swing, and you could be hitting more fairways and greens in your next round of golf.





# MAGICOF THE MASTERS

For all the layers of brilliance to the annual Masters Tournament, one thing stands out above all others.

More than any other week on the golf tournament, the festivities at Augusta National Golf Club in Georgia cast a magical spell on not only the tens of thousands of patrons who are fortunate enough to attend, but on millions


of fans across the globe who will watch on TV or other digital platforms of choice.

Oh, and those skilled enough to compete in the Masters hold the tournament in high esteem, too.

"It's a very electric atmosphere out there. This is the Masters. It's got the beauty, it's got the colour, it's got the sound and the breezes.

Everything together makes this place special."

Those words were spoken by Nick Faldo, who may be long retired not only from his competitive days but also from his TV commentary duties, and how we'll hear his name tied to the 2025 Masters. That's because the dynamic Scottie Scheffler is going to attempt to match Masters feats that only a






handful of the game's greatest names have recorded, Faldo being one of them.

When he embarks upon his sixth Masters (April 10-13), Scheffler will be trying to become just the fourth player to successfully defend his title. He would match Jack Nicklaus (1965-66), Faldo (1989-90), and Tiger Woods (2001-02).

Scheffler is also in position to become just the ninth player in history to win at least three Masters (Nicklaus has six; Woods five; Arnold Palmer four; Jimmy Demaret, Sam Snead, Gary Player, Faldo, and Phil Mickelson all have three). And what could put Scheffler in even more rarified air is this - with Green Jackets in '22, '24 and '25, he would match Nicklaus (1963, '65, '66) as the only winners of three Masters in a four-year window.

Remarkable stuff from the reigning FedExCup champion and World No. 1, and for what will be the most hyped story going into this year's Masters. However, the 28-year-old often sidesteps the focus on his chase for history and explains just what it is about this April showcase that stirs the emotions.

"To be here on property every year is extremely special," said Scheffler, who made his Masters debut in 2020 with a T9 finish. "I mean, it seems like it all stands out. Everything is done so well here. But mostly for me, it's the golf course and the practice facilities and just getting to come out here and compete.

"The crowds always are wonderful and it's just a joy to play this tournament."

That Scheffler's sentiments would likely be echoed by the majority of colleagues who've had the chance to play in the Masters speaks volumes for the aura of the tournament. Players appreciate the specialness of qualifying for the Masters, since the field is generally kept under 100 competitors, and

golf fans who love the Masters would counter with their reasons why.

Start with the fact it's the only professional major that is played on the same stage year after year, going back to 1934. That galvanizes a connection with the fan, who feels a kinship to a course he or she knows very well - from the wild slope of the green at the par-3 sixth to the right-to-left bend at the No. 9 fairway, to the iconic set of shots required at Amen Corner, to the incomparable par 5s on the back nine.

Augusta National isn't the only revered golf course to name its holes, but likely many fans would win some money if challenged to call the par-3 12th by its name. (Golden Bell.) And if you were to quiz Masters patrons about "the shot heard 'round the world" or who won the Green Jacket at the age of 46, chances are solidly in the majority that you'd receive correct answers - Gene Sarazen's "double-eagle (albatross)" in 1935 and Jack Nicklaus in 1986.

Why? Because the tournament not only is dipped in history; it is dipped in history that viewers have studied. Players themselves feel it when they're on the revered golf course. "You get the feeling that Bobby Jones (founder) is standing out there with you," said two-time U.S. Open champion, Lee Janzen.

The charm of the Masters is felt when reports arrive in late winter about what will be new at Augusta National. This year, there were dispatches about wider walking areas for patrons and how efforts were prompt to address tree damage in the aftermath of Hurricane Helene.

You can also measure intense fan passion for the Masters when they recite how manageable are the prices for concessions, to the severe challenge to two-putt these greens, to how cruel the Golf Gods can be when it comes to this April classic.

Patrons (as the fans as referred to as at the Masters) and players alike will concede that no one is owed anything at the event, no matter how deep the talent runs. That is why Johnny Miller, Lee Trevino and Tom Weiskopf never earned a Green Jacket and why Rory McIlroy, Justin Thomas, and Xander Schauffele are currently a combined 0-for-32.

In other words, ownership of the Masters runs thick with players and patrons, and they are deeply invested in this tournament.

To spread the charm around, the caretakers of the Masters were clairvoyant when they started the Asia-Pacific Amateur Championship in 2009 and watched the 2010-11 winner, Hideki Matsuyama, morph into a Masters champion in 2021. So would it surprise anyone that the Latin American Amateur Championship, introduced in 2015, produced a winner - Joaquin Niemann - who could emerge with a Green Jacket? Certainly not.

That is the uncanny awe of the Masters, it connects us to global talents and teaches us that a unique style of play is required at Augusta National. It also leaves us with a sense of nostalgia for special anniversaries and so we know that key ones that will be celebrated in 2025 include:

\* The 50th anniversary of arguably the greatest Masters played (Nicklaus' win in 1975 over Miller and Weiskopf).

- \* The 20th anniversary of what just might be Woods' most epic shot, the improbable chip from behind the 16th green that fueled his win over Chris DiMarco.
  - \* And the 10th anniversary of that stirring win by 21-year-old Jordan Spieth in just his second appearance at Augusta National.
  - "To join Masters history and put my name on that trophy and to have this jacket forever, it's something that I can't fathom right now," Spieth said the unforgettable April Sunday 10 years ago.

That his emotions have been deflated in years since (the painful T2 in '16 and twice he's been third) is a part of the journey the Masters takes us on. That a great many of us will eagerly await what he does in his 12th Masters start in April is part and parcel of our investment in this tournament.

#### MIN WOO LEE HOLDS NERVE FOR FIRST PGA TOUR TITLE



Min Woo Lee held off the challenge of a high-class chasing pack to win his first PGA TOUR

title at the Texas Children's Houston Open.

The Australian entered the final round at Memorial Park Golf Course with a four-shot lead and despite barely putting a foot wrong in making birdies on the third, ninth, 12th and 13th on the final day, he endured a tense finish amid charges from Gary Woodland and Scottie Scheffler.

The 2019 U.S. Open champion picked up four shots in his final four holes in a course-record equalling 62 and was joined in the clubhouse lead at 19 under by World Number One Scheffler, who made four birdies in a row from the 13th in a 63.

At that point, Lee's lead had been reduced to

one as the three-time DP World Tour winner hit a ragged tee-shot on the 16th and made a bogey to ramp up the pressure.

After parring the 17th, he missed the green



at the last but managed to cozy up a putt from 55 feet to eight inches, sparking celebrations before he tapped home to seal a par, a 67 and a narrow victory.

Woodland's tie for second was his best result

since undergoing brain suurgery in 2023 and his 62 was matched by Lee's fellow dual member Sami Välimäki, who finished at 17 under. Rory McIlroy was two shots further back in a tie for fifth at 15 under after a 64.

#### **VIKTOR HOVLAND** CLAIMS SEVENTH PGA TOUR WIN AT VALSPAR CHAMPIONSHIP



To the outsider it appeared at times as if he was moving in the wrong direction and after arriving at Innisbrook Resort off the back of three missed cuts, he admitted he was not even sure if he would tee it up. But play he did and after rounds of 70-67-69, he shared the 54-hole lead in seach of a first worldwide victory since the 2023 Tour Championship when he clinched FedEx Cup glory.

He did not have it all his own way on, with

five holes to play he was three behind a surging Justin Thomas.

But he birdied the 14th and then the 16th and 17th on the Copperhead Course's renowned Snake Pit finish, allowing him the luxury of a bogey on the last as Thomas bogeyed the 16th and 18th.

He added: "I just

tried to go out there and play my game and I knew I didn't feel super comfortable or confident but I was really patient and just tried to play really smart and I think that's a



credit kind of to myself."

The victory moves Hovland up to eighth in the Official World Golf Ranking and 19th in the European Ryder Cup Rankings.

#### MANSELL SECURES MAIDEN TITLE AT PORSCHE SINGAPORE CLASSIC



Richard Mansell claimed his maiden DP World Tour title after finishing with a brilliant birdie

to earn a one-shot victory at the weathershortened Porsche Singapore Classic. With the tournament reduced to 54 holes following the washout, Mansell went into the third and final round one shot off the lead on ten under par.

The Englishman soon hit the front after following up three opening pars with five birdies in a row from the fourth hole at

Laguna National Golf Resort Club, heading to the turn with a two-shot lead. The 29-year-old was joined at the top on the back nine, however Mansell saved his best until last, two-putting from over 100 feet for a birdie at the 18th to sign for a closing 66

new caddie David Kenny on the bag as the Englishman moves to the top of the Asian Swing Rankings. Nakajima made seven birdies in a spotless 65 to surge into contention but was denied a play-off by Mansell's heroics at the last.

The Japanese 24-year-old finished alone in second spot on 15 under, one ahead of Northern Irishman Tom McKibbin and Frenchman Adrien Saddier in a tie for third.

#### CALUM HILL WINS PLAY-OFF TO CLAIM JOBURG OPEN TITLE



Scotland's Calum Hill claimed his second DP World Tour title in style as he beat home favourites Jacques

Kruyswijk and Shaun Norris in a play-off to win the Joburg Open after coming from eight shots back to earn a share of the lead after 72 holes. After all three players parred the first play-off hole, a par was good enough for Hill to win it at the second just as lightning arrived

in the area, after Norris found the water and Kruyswijk missed his five-foot putt.

The win ended Hill's wait for a second DP World Tour title, having secured his first at the 2021 Cazoo Classic. Hill turned in 31 in his final round after carding five birdies and a bogey on the front nine before following up another birdie at the 11th with a hat-trick from the 13th to storm into contention and join the lead for the first time.

After a bogey on the 16th saw him slip from the summit, Hill birdied the last from five feet, that took him level at the top with Kruyswijk, who had four holes left to complete, while Norris and others were also still in with a chance of hunting down the clubhouse leader,



with plenty of holes remaining.

A bogey from Kruyswijk at the 15th boosted Hill's chances but Norris birdied the 16th from range to join the group just one shot behind Hill. Kruyswijk moved alongside Hill at the top once more with a five-foot birdie on the 17th before a monster birdie putt from Norris

at the last sparked wild celebrations from the crowd and made it a three-man play-off.

There was nothing to separate the trio at the first extra hole but after watching his 20-foot birdie putt come up agonisingly short at the second, a par proved enough for Hill to clinch victory.



#### **JENEATH WONG** WINS IN DRAMATIC FASHION AT HOIANA SHORES

hey call Hoi An the city of lanterns and it was Jeneath Wong who shone brightest en route to winning the seventh edition of the Women's Amateur Asia-Pacific (WAAP) championship. With a skilful and courageous display of front-running, the 20-year-old wrote her name into the record books as the first Malaysian winner of the region's pre-eminent women's amateur championship.

After a tense and intriguing battle with Korean playing partners Soomin Oh and Sumin Hong that went right down to the wire, it was the diminutive Malaysian who was walking tallest.

With rounds of 65, 69, 64 and 68 at Hoiana Shores, Wong's 72-hole aggregate of 18-under 266 was the lowest winning total in WAAP history, surpassing the 270 total of Chinese Taipei's Chun-wei Wu in Thailand last year. Over the course of the four days in Vietnam, Wong made 24 birdies against just four bogeys and one double-bogey.

Wong already has considerable top-level experience having competed in the US Women's Open at Pebble Beach and the Augusta National



Women's Amateur in 2023, also reaching the match play stages of the 120th Women's Amateur, US Women's Amateur and US Girls' Junior that year. As well as having won the Women's Australian Master of the Amateurs in 2022 and the Australian Girls' Amateur in both 2021 and 2022, Wong's impressive curriculum vitae includes an individual bronze and team silver medal with Malaysia at the 2022 Southeast Asian (SEA) Games in Vietnam.

emotional for me. My whole family was there, my coach was there - basically everyone who had helped guide me along the way for years to get to that moment was there. To put on the Green Jacket was extremely cool. As the previous winner [in 2021], Hideki Matsuyama was able to put the Green Jacket on me which was fun as he is a fellow Rolex Testimonee. Being able to join the long list of Testimonees

to have won the Masters such as Tiger and Jack and being able to go into the Champions Locker Room every year is a really cool experience. As you are putting on the Green Jacket, the emotions flow through you and I was just really grateful to be in that moment.

# How do you reflect on this success in 2024 and can you tell us about the different sources of inspiration or motivation on this continued pursuit of excellence?

**SS:** As far as sources of motivation go, I've always been internally motivated. I'm always trying to get the best out of myself. I'm not focused on the results. I try to focus on the process of getting better. When I talk about the start of 2024 when I was trying to improve my putting, I'm not all of a sudden going to come up with one thing that fixes it. It's a process that takes a lot of time and a lot of work. To be focused on the process of improving and not the results is important. As far as the year went, I was able to capitalize on a lot of the opportunities that I had from playing good golf. I'm not good at reflecting on it, but it was definitely a fun year and I'm very grateful to have had the success that I've had.



#### NUTRITION FOR GOLF PLAYERS: FUELING PERFORMANCE AND RECOVERY

Golf requires physical stamina, mental focus, and sustained energy, particularly during tournaments that can last several hours. Proper nutrition optimizes performance, aids recovery, and promotes overall health. Evidence from Burke and Cox (2010), Jeukendru and Gleeson (2019), and Thomas et al. (2016) emphasizes the importance of strategic nutrition in athletic performance and endurance sports.

#### KEY NUTRITIONAL NEEDS FOR GOLFERS

#### > Carbohydrates for Sustained Energy

Carbohydrates are the primary energy source for sustained focus and endurance during a round of golf. Complex carbs, such as whole grains, oats, and quinoa, should be a dietary foundation. Simple carbs, like fruits, can be consumed during play for quick energy boosts. As Burke and Cox (2010) highlight, maintaining glycogen stores through adequate carbohydrate intake is critical for prolonged performance.

#### > Protein for Muscle Recovery

Protein is essential for muscle repair and

recovery, especially for golfers engaging in strength training. Sources like lean meats, fish, eggs, and plant-based proteins such as tofu and lentils are ideal. Jeukendrup and Gleeson (2019) recommend consuming 20–30 grams of high-quality protein within two hours' post-exercise to maximize recovery.

#### > Healthy Fats for Sustained Energy

Healthy fats, such as those found in avocados, nuts, seeds, and olive oil, provide long-lasting energy and support brain function. These facts are particularly valuable for golfers who require sustained mental focus during extended games (Jeukendrup & Gleeson, 2019).

#### > Hydration and Electrolyte Balance

Maintaining proper hydration is vital

to prevent fatigue and ensure optimal performance. Water is essential, but during prolonged games, electrolyte-rich drinks can help replenish sodium, potassium, and other electrolytes lost through sweat. Burke and Cox (2010) caution that even mild dehydration can impair both physical and cognitive performance.

#### > Micronutrients for Overall Health

Vitamins and minerals like magnesium, potassium, and B vitamins play key roles in energy metabolism and muscle function. These can be obtained through a diet rich in vegetables, fruits, nuts, and whole grains (Thomas et al., 2016).

#### Conclusion

Golfers can enhance their performance and recovery by adopting a well-balanced diet tailored to their energy demands.

Regular meals, adequate hydration, and strategic snacking ensure sustained focus and endurance. As Jeukendrup and Gleeson (2019) emphasize, nutrition is a cornerstone of success in competitive sports.

#### Pre-Game Nutrition

A balanced meal 2–3 hours before a game is ideal and should include:

- Complex carbohydrates (e.g., oatmeal or wholegrain toast)
- Lean protein (e.g., eggs or yogurt)
- Healthy fats (e.g., avocado or nuts)
- Hydration (e.g., water or herbal tea)

A light snack, such as a banana or an energy bar, 30–60 minutes before teeoff provides an extra energy boost (Thomas et al., 2016).

#### On Course Nutrition

To maintain energy levels, golfers should consume portable snacks such as:

- Mixed nuts or trail mix
- Fresh or dried fruits
- Protein bars or small sandwiches

Hydration should be maintained by sipping water or sports drinks regularly during the game (Jeukendrup & Gleeson, 2019).

#### Post-Game Recovery Nutrition

Golfers should prioritize recovery by consuming a meal or snack within 30 minutes of finishing their game.

This meal should include carbohydrates to replenish glycogen and protein to aid muscle repair.

For example, grilled chicken with quinoa and steamed vegetables or a smoothie with protein powder, fruit, and almond milk are effective options (Burke & Cox, 2010).

memorable triumph ahead
of his hat-trick attempt
from March 13-16, 2025.

t was pretty special to win backto-back PLAYERS titles. That's something you never really get the opportunity to do very often. It's tough enough to win one PLAYERS, and I was thankful to become the first player to repeat as champion in our flagship event.

I remember putting up a good fight for four days. My caddie Ted Scott was instrumental in the win as he kept me in a good head space the whole week as I was battling a neck injury which flared up during the second round.

It became quite painful especially when I was putting, but I'm a pretty competitive guy, and





I didn't want to give up in the tournament. I did what I could to hang around until my neck got better which it did by the weekend due to some great work by my physio.

When you get an acute injury like that, if you can wake up the next day feeling a little bit better or the exact same, it's a win. Usually, the morning after is worse and when I woke up on Saturday, it felt a little bit better and I was able to hit some shots, and then on Sunday, I woke up feeling fairly close to normal and went out there and had a good round of golf.

I headed into the final round with the intention to get off to a good start on the front nine. I felt like if I could shoot a low front nine to put myself back into the tournament, that was really my goal. I was aiming for some early birdies, and I parred the first three holes, and then the hole-out for eagle on No. 4 really got me going. On the back nine, I remember hitting a lot of good shots and made some nice putts to close out my round.

It was really fun to be able to secure the win with a closing 64 and I think that's why we put in all the work to be able to finish off tournaments and to play well at the right time. It's nice coming out on top for sure and it's a great feeling.

Competing for wins on the PGA TOUR, it's a real test both mentally and physically. I think mentally it can be very taxing but it's also a lot of fun being in the final groups, although it can take a toll on your body and mind. The week at THE PLAYERS was certainly a physical test, with how my neck was for a couple of days. So I had put a lot into trying to win the golf tournament and at the end of it, it was very satisfying to walk away with the trophy.

To me, being in contention is the most fun you can have on a golf course. We come out here to compete and try to win tournaments against the best players in the world and being in that environment, being in the arena, is a ton of fun.

It was truly a battle at THE PLAYERS last year, and a hard-fought week in every sense as a lot of guys played some really good golf and a few of them finished at 19-under; and I happened to finish at 20. That's some really good golf around The Stadium Course at TPC Sawgrass.

#### THE BASICS

## NAIL YOUR POSTURE EVERY TIME

Get your posture right and you give yourself your best chance of playing well. Get it wrong, and you're going to have a miserable day.

The world's best players are always checking the fundamentals, especially their posture, and one of the best you can copy is Adam Scott's. He says: "A good posture enables you to make an athletic and controlled movement. You want to get into a comfortable position where you feel confident about hitting the ball.

"I like to get my back fairly straight with my knees flexed just enough to engage my quads and my butt sticking out comfortably. My arms hang naturally down to the grip, with the butt of the club around a hand's width from my thigh. It's a routine I use for every swing I make, whether I'm on the range at home or competing in a PGA Tour event."

Here is a simple four-step process to develop a posture like Scott's - and a couple of checkpoints at the end to make sure you're on the right track.



Stand upright, your feet shoulder-width apart. Take a mid-iron and place the butt against your belt buckle, the shaft horizontal. Grip a few inches on to the metal with your lead hand only.

Tilt forward with your upper body.
Keep the butt of the club against the belt buckle as
you go down, preserving that triangle between your
torso, lead arm and the top half of the club.



Keep tilting forward until you reach a natural stop. Your legs will now feel straight, your weight out into your toes. Take the tension out by softening the knees; feel the kneecaps are over your shoelaces.




Without changing the posture you have created, drop the club against your leg and let your arms hang down from your shoulders. This guides you to where your hands should be when you grip the club.

## **SWING PATH CHECKER**

A launch monitor will set you back around £20,000. A shoe box comes free with a pair of shoes. Either can tell you a lot about your swing path

**Set your lines** Place a shoe box on its side at the range, parallel to your ball-to-target line. Now put a ball close enough to the box so that there's only a golf ball's width between the box and the toe of your club. We'd recommend using a mid-iron for this drill.

Miss the box Because we stand to the side of the ball, the swing path works from inside to inside the ball-target line. Impact will ideally take place on the point of the arc where the club briefly swings along the target line. Achieve this neutral path and the toe of the club never gets closer to the box.

**Collision course** If you swing across the target line through the impact zone, the iron will hit the box. It will hit the back of the box if your swing path is too much out-to-in, and it will hit the front of the box if your swing path it too in-to-out. Use a box like this every two weeks to check your path remains in good shape. THE DOWNLOAD

#### **Build better** rhythm and tempo into your swing

#### The Metronome Free on the app store

For most of us, the metronome is a device used by musicians to keep a beat. But in recent years, creative coaches have asked why golfers shouldn't use the same device to a similar end. Swinging to an external, regular beep, they argue, can assist with developing consistent

Though there are one or two bespoke golf metronome devices out there, the quickest and easiest way to try this is to download a free metronome app onto your smart phone. Most apps allow you to adjust the beeps or tones per minute – TG coach Gareth Johnston recommends around 60bpm as a good place to start. If other golfers are practising close to you, either adjust the volume or listen through headphones. From here, aim to start the swing on one beat and strike the ball on the next. If 60bpm feels too fast or slow, adjust to your own preferred speed. Once your tempo is set, try to copy it each time.

Note that this can be used on any golf shot, from full swing to short putt.



## **FLIGHT CONTROL**

Every short game needs a variety of shots, especially high and low ones. That means controlling your ball flight — and here's a brilliant way to do it. All you need is your bag, a shaft or alignment cane and a wedge... though as you get used to the game, change clubs. Go as high as a lob wedge and as low as an 8-iron. Master this challenge by hitting five consecutive shots above and below the bar. If you can do that, you've added valuable versatility to your short game.






## MAKE SURE YOUR NEXT SHOT IS A PUTT

The world's best players rarely make a poor decision because they talk everything through with their caddies. Over the years numerous caddies have told us they could save anyone shots with the right advice, at the right time. While we can't send Joe LaCava, Billy Foster or Fanny Sunesson to join you on a round, we can share the tips and tricks that will make a difference to your game. Here, we take a look at four short game situations.

Greenside bunker splash
THE SITUATION The ball is lying pretty
well in the sand but there's water
lurking long.

HOW TO PLAY IT Position the ball just forward of centre, widen your stance, flex your knees a little more than normal and dig your feet into the sand to give yourself a stable base. Open your sand wedge a little to engage the bounce and add loft and hit aggressively into the sand about two inches behind the ball. With water long and a bit of green to work with, you're better off taking a little too much sand than too little as the chunk and release is safer.



Flop it over the hazard
THE SITUATION A short pitch from a
downhill lie in the rough with a
bunker between you and the hole.
HOW TO PLAY IT Set up so your body matches
the slope and open up your most lofted
wedge to give yourself as much loft as you
are comfortable using. Create a shallow
attack angle so the clubhead glides under the
ball – but beware the club doesn't slide under
the ball completely if it's sat up in the rough!
Pick a landing spot about halfway to the hole
so you don't go in the bunker if you under-hit
it or don't get the contact you desire.

Chip and run from short grass
THE SITUATION A relatively simple chip
from a good lie and with plenty of
green to work with.

HOW TO PLAY IT You want to get the ball running like a putt as quickly as possible, so take the club that will carry the ball about a yard onto the green and release it the required distance to the pin — anything from 7-iron to PW. Keep your feet quite narrow and make sure your heels are square to your start line. Stand a little closer to the ball in the middle of your stance, choke down on the grip and rock your shoulders like a putt with minimal wrist hinge.

Chip from the rough
THE SITUATION The ball is sitting down,
the green is slightly above you and
you're short-sided.

HOW TO PLAY IT You need to pop the ball out a little higher to carry it to the green and help it stop a little quicker than a normal chip. Take a more lofted club like a SW and move the ball an inch further back in your stance to encourage a slightly steeper attack angle. Keep a simple swing from rocking the shoulders, but you can introduce a little wrist hinge to add some clubhead speed. Be aggressive through the ball.

#### **LEARN A NEW SHOT**

# GET HOT UNDER THE COLLAR

A ball trickling off the back of the green can cause problems when it nestles snugly against the first cut. While the putting surface might only be a foot in front of you, longer grass means you can't really putt it, or get the bottom of the club to the back of the ball. Here's a solution, and with just a little practice it can become a really useful shot to have in the bag... ## **HOW TO PLAY IT**



#### Hover it, just a little bit

Use the leading edge of your wedge.
Such a thin surface won't snag in the longer grass. Strike the middle of the ball and it will run like a putt. A strike slightly above the equator can also work, adding topspin to help the ball roll.



#### Level angle of attack

The key to executing this shot is attack angle. Anything downwards will tend to send the leading edge below the ball's equator. A level attack from a hovered clubhead will help your contact. Promote this with a mid-stance ball position.



#### Hit it like a putt

For the best results, use a wrist-free putting-style stroke. Wrist action creates angles that can lead to a damaging descending blow; with a shoulder-led, wrist-free stroke you can sweep the wedge low to the ground.



#### **DE ROEY** CLINCHES THIRD LET TITLE AT AUSTRALIAN WOMEN'S CLASSIC

Manon De Roey made a clutch birdie at the 18th hole of the Australian Women's Classic to clinch the title and become a three-time Ladies European Tour (LET) winner.

On a nervy final day, the Belgian kept her cool late on dialling in an excellent approach to seven-feet at the par-4 18th before sealing the putt for LET victory number three.

Signing for a round of 69 (-1), De Roey pipped England's Cara Gainer to the trophy with a winning score of nine-under par.

De Roey responded with a birdie at the 7th to level things up leaving things wide open

heading into the back-nine.

With Gainer in the clubhouse lead on eightunder par after a pair of excellent birdies at the 17th and 18th, it all came down to the final hole. De Roey would rip her drive down the middle before dialling in an excellent



54-degree wedge to seven-feet. Under pressure she then rolled in the birdie to clinch the title.

The victory is De Roey's third on the LET after she won the 2022 Aramco Team

Series - Bangkok title and 2024 Investec SA Women's Open.

In the 2025 LET Order of Merit, De Roey collects 500 points and jumps into second spot 325.14 points behind Gainer.

#### RHODES KEEPS HER COOL TO WIN FORD WOMEN'S NSW OPEN

Mimi Rhodes produced a composed final day display at Wollongong Golf Club to win the Ford Women's NSW Open by two shots and earn a maiden Ladies European Tour (LET) victory.

The 23-year-old rookie went bogey-free on Sunday carding a round of 69 (-2) to end the week on 17-under par.

On a tense final day, Rhodes – competing in only her fourth event as a full LET member - showed maturity way beyond her years carding 14 straight pars after birdies at the 2nd and 4th. This came two days after she fired the course record 62 (-9) at Wollongong Golf Club.

The 23-year-old adds the maiden LET title to her impressive catalogue of amateur wins - a resume which includes a Curtis Cup, US Kids European Championship, Justin Rose Telegraph Junior Golf Championship and NCAA Division I Women's Golf Championship. The victory also comes one year after Rhodes won the Lavaux Ladies Open.

In the LET Order of Merit, Rhodes collects



500 points and jumps into third position on 536.50 points. England's Cara Gainer remains

POSITION ON 536.50 POINTS.

Manon De Roey is in second on 577.50 points having fired a final round 65 (-6) in Australia to finish T9. The result comes a week after she won the Australian Women's Classic at Coffs Harbour.



#### **HYO JOO KIM** RALLIES WITH 64 AND BEATS LILIA VU IN AN LPGA PLAYOFF IN ARIZONA

Hyo Joo Kim rallied from a four-shot deficit with an 8-under 64 to force a playoff, defeating Lilia Vu on the first extra hole with a 6-foot birdie putt in the Ford Championship.

Kim won for the seventh time on the LPGA and emerged from a long and wild day in the desert at Whirlwind Golf Club with 10 birdies in the 19 holes she played.

Vu hit a splendid bunker shot on the par-5 17th to set up a short birdie to tie Kim. Her approach on the 18th bounded across the firm green, she chipped to 7 feet and holed the par putt for a 68 to send the tournament into extra holes. Vu missed a birdie putt from about 15 feet, setting up Kim for the win.

"The feeling was great today and I just thought one hole at a time, one birdie at a time," Kim said through her interpreter. She was at her best in the playoff, especially with the combination of wind and bouncy

greens making it difficult to figure out where to land shots on the green. Kim's approach in the playoff rolled out perfectly. Kim won \$337,500, sending her over \$10 million for

her career on the LPGA Tour.

Defending champion Nelly Korda fell out of the mix on Saturday and shot a 69 on Sunday to finish in a tie for 22nd.

## **SAGSTROM** WINS T-MOBILE MATCH PLAY OVER COUGHLIN TO EARN FIRST TITLE IN NEARLY 1,900 DAYS

After playing her fourth 18-plus hole match of the week on at Shadow Creek Golf Course, it was ultimately Madelene Sagstrom who came out on top in Las Vegas, winning 1-up over Lauren Coughlin to capture her second career victory on the LPGA Tour.

The Championship Match saw Sagstrom take an early 1-up lead on the second hole of the round, an advantage she extended to two after winning the par-5 4th hole. The Swede then won holes five and six to move four ahead with 12 holes to play in Sin City, but Coughlin immediately started chipping away at that deficit and fought her way back to 1 up after winning seven, eight and nine.

The T-Mobile Match Play presented by MGM Rewards is Sagstrom's first Tour title since she became a Rolex First-Time Winner at the Gainbridge LPGA at Boca Rio back in 2020, and it was a hard-earned victory, considering the Swede is the first player in the history of this event to amass a 7-0-0 record.

Coughlin was disappointed to fall just short of earning her third career LPGA Tour title on Sunday afternoon, particularly considering how hard she grinded throughout the entirety of the T-Mobile Match Play, playing a whopping



seven matches of at least 18 holes over the past five days. But she is looking on the bright side as much as she can in this moment and will carry a lot of confidence forward from this performance even though she didn't feel like she had her strongest stuff, as it reinforced Coughlin's self-identity as a fighter.

Having lost in the semifinal matches, Jutanugarn and Yin will each be awarded a T3 finish as the consolation match has been eliminated from the format at the T-Mobile Match Play presented by MGM Rewards. Sagstrom earns \$300,000 and 500 Race to the CME Globe points as part of her victory.



#### **LETH-NISSEN** SECURES FIRST PROFESSIONAL VICTORY AT THE TERRE BLANCHE **LADIES OPEN**

Overnight leader Amalie Leth-Nissen produced a composed final day display to win the Terre Blanche Ladies Open by three shots and earn a maiden Ladies European Tour Access Series (LETAS) victory.

The Dane got off to a shaky start with a bogey on the first before an amazing eagle on the sixth allowed her some breathing room. A double bogey on hole seven followed by a bogey on hole nine threatened her lead yet Leth-Nissen brought it back on the back nine with birdies on 10 and 18.

It was a family affair for the Leth Nissens' with Mum caddying for sister Cecilie who finished tied 18th and her father Christian caddying for Amalie. The last couple of years have been a struggle for the Dane, who after earning her LET playing rights at the 2022 Q School found the transition to professional life difficult and failed to keep them for the following year.

The 20-year-old adds the maiden LETAS title to her impressive catalogue of amateur records- a resume which includes a PING Junior Solheim Cup win, a European Girls' Team Championship and the 2019 Junior Vagliano Trophy.



French amateur Sara Brentcheneff finished runner-up for the second year in a row on sevenunder-par and whilst she may have not won the tournament she won the crowd's heart. Swiss amateur Natalie Armbruester finished solo third on six-under-par whilst Finland's Elina Saksa and Czechia's Patricie Mackova finished tied fourth one shot back.

#### ROOKIE **RHODES** SECURES BACK-TO-BACK WINS

England's Mimi Rhodes claimed her second Ladies European Tour (LET) title at the Joburg Ladies Open, achieving back-to-back victories in her rookie season. This remarkable feat marks a significant milestone for the 23-year-old, setting an impressive tone for the 2025 season, after her recent triumph at the Ford Women's NSW Open in Australia just weeks earlier.

Leading by three shots heading into the final round, Rhodes started the day ahead of South Africa's Casandra Alexander and Ireland's Lauren Walsh who were both in T2.

The rising star produced a composed final day at Modderfontein Golf Club, carding three birdies, and posting a round of 71 (-2) to end the week on 14-under par. Despite weather conditions being tough this week due to heavy rainfall, the 23-year-old has shown great

composure the whole week.

reduced to 54 holes, announced on Friday, following heavy rainfall and a flooded course. In the LET Order of Merit, Rhodes now leads the standings following her second win with 1,036.50 to her name. England's Cara Gainer is now in second place on 870.18, followed by Belgian's Manon De Roey on 577.50 points.

After five tournaments played, the young star leads the Rookie of the Year standings, with Arwefiall in second place, following her strong start to the season.



#### **ANGELA STANFORD** NAMED CAPTAIN FOR 2026 U.S. SOLHEIM CUP TEAM

After three turns as an assistant captain, Angela Stanford will take the helm of her first U.S. Solheim Cup Team in 2026. Stanford, a six-time veteran of the American squad, will captain the top 12 American female golfers as they represent their country at Bernardus Golf in the Netherlands, from Sept. 11-13, 2026.

Stanford retired in 2024 after a 23-year LPGA Tour career. She has seven LPGA Tour victories, earning her first major title at the 2018 Amundi Evian Championship in her 18th season on Tour. Stanford has also won the 2023 and 2024 Senior LPGA Championships.

She competed in 98 consecutive major championships from 2002 to 2024, second only to Jack Nicklaus for consecutive majors played in professional golf.

Stanford has competed in six Solheim Cups, representing the USA in 2003, 2007, 2009, 2011, 2013 and 2015. In 2015, Stanford earned the winning point for the U.S. Team with her 2-and-1 victory over Suzann Pettersen. She then served as an assistant captain in 2021 under Captain Pat Hurst, and again in 2023 and 2024 under Captain Stacy Lewis.



Prior to joining the LPGA Tour, Stanford was a four-year All-American at Texas Christian University, where she won nine collegiate tournaments. She is a 2000 TCU graduate with a degree in Speech Communications and is enshrined in the Texas Golf Hall of Fame and the TCU Athletics Hall of Fame.

Off the course, Stanford runs the Angela Stanford Foundation, which provides scholarships to kids in her native Texas whose families have fallen victim to breast cancer. Stanford works in honour of her mother, Nan, who battled the disease for 13 years before her death in 2022.

## LPGA ANNOUNCES ADDITIONAL UPDATE TO NEW PACE OF PLAY POLICY

The Ladies Professional Golf Association (LPGA) confirmed an additional change to the updated Pace of Play Policy that was previously announced. The LPGA and Epson Tours will add a seasonlong tracking element for holes timed as part of a continuous effort to improve pace of play. Players who have 40 or more holes timed during the remaining scheduled events on

the LPGA Tour (excluding the T-Mobile Match Play presented by MGM Rewards, U.S. Women's Open, Dow Championship and AIG Women's Open) will receive a fine. This addition will also go into effect on March 27 at the Ford Championship presented by Wild Horse Pass, along with the previously announced changes.

Players who have 20 or more holes timed

for the remainder of the 2025 Epson Tour season will also receive a fine, which will go into effect starting April 25 at the IOA Championship presented by Morongo Casino Resort and Spa.

"Looking at the data, we concluded that if a player had 40 or more holes timed over the season, that player contributed to a slower pace of play," said LPGA Player President Vicki-Goetze Ackerman. "We believe that this addition to the policy, along with penalty strokes being issued for plus times of +6 or greater, will increase the number of players who heed the initial warnings, leading to fewer players out of position and therefore timings."


## FIA JCB GOLF TOURNAMENT



ineteen-year-old Englishman Joshua Berry capped a dream week with a playoff victory at the US\$300,000 Kolkata Challenge



## ROOKIE **RAJESH KUMAR GAUTAM** REGISTERS WIN AFTER STEADY FINAL ROUND 72 AT PGTI NEXGEN GURUGRAM

Lucknow's Rajesh Kumar Gautam, a rookie on the PGTI who is currently serving in the Indian Army, came up with a steady final round performance of even-par 72 to register a two-shot win at a total of nine-under 207 at the INR 20 lakh PGTI NEXGEN Gurugram 2025, the NEXGEN season-opener, played at the Golden Greens Golf & Polo Club in Gurugram.

The 35-year-old Rajesh (69-66-72), the overnight leader by three shots, made five birdies and five bogeys on the last day to



hang on to his lead and record his first professional win.

Chandigarh's Rajiv Kumar Jatiwal (65-73-71) posted a 71 in the third round to finish runner-up at seven-under 209.

Rajesh Kumar Gautam produced four birdies and three bogeys on the front-nine on day four which included a great chip from the bunker on the ninth

that set up a tap-in birdie. On the back-nine Rajesh added another birdie and two bogeys. He landed it within three to four feet of the flag throughout the day.

Rajesh said, "Even though I was not in good driving form and couldn't execute my plans of



hitting maximum regulations today, I managed to stay ahead thanks to some accurate iron shots and putting. I was regularly landing my shots close to the flags. It's great to win in only my second start after turning professional. This gives me a lot of confidence going ahead."

Panchkula's Brijesh Kumar saved his best for the last as he produced the final day's best score of five-under 67 to post an incredible come-from-behind victory at the PGTI NEXGEN Kapurthala 2025 played at the RCF Golf Course in Kapurthala.

Twenty-five-year-old Brijesh Kumar (68-70-67), who was overnight tied fourth and four shots off the lead, finished with a winning total of 11-under 205 to triumph with a two-shot margin.

Delhi's Ajay Baisoya (67-67-73), the overnight leader by three shots, returned a 73 on day three to end the week as runner-up at nine-under 207.

Brijesh Kumar, playing his third season as a professional, had a strong front-nine in round three where he scored three birdies which included two







outstanding recovery shots from the bunkers. Brijesh then worked some magic with his chipping and putting that earned him birdies on the 11th, 14th, 17th and saw him march to victory.

Brijesh said, "Interestingly, my roommate this week was Ajay Baisoya and both of us kept encouraging each other to win when we spoke in the evening after the rounds. The fact that I performed well at the PGTI Q School this year to earn an 'A' card and then got off to a decent start on the main tour, gave me a lot of confidence coming into the NEXGEN events."















## WASIM KHAN WINS MAIDEN TITLE AT PGTI NEXGEN'S PHILLAUR OPEN PRESENTED BY R S GILL





asim Khan of Delhi shot a final round score of four-under 67 to move his total to 10-under 203 for the week and thus win his maiden

title at the PGTI NEXGEN's Phillaur Open presented by R S Gill played at the Ranjitgarh Golf Club in Phillaur, Punjab.

Lucknow's Rajesh Kumar Gautam (68) and Chandimandir's Chandarjeet Yadav (69) finished joint runners-up at a total of eight-under 205.

Thirty-four-year-old Wasim Khan (67-69-67), who was overnight tied third and one off the lead, outperformed the rest of the field on the final day as he mixed seven birdies with a bogey and a double-bogey during his round of 67.

Wasim's iron-play was the highlight of his round on day three as he landed it within three feet of the flag to set up three of his birdies. He was also consistent with the putter as he sank three birdies from a range of 10 to 12 feet. Wasim closed it out well with a birdie on the 17th and a crucial par on the 18th.

Khan picked up the winning cheque worth INR 2,54,300 to climb from 11th place to second







position in the 2025 PGTI NEXGEN Order of Merit. Wasim's total earnings for the season now read INR 3,54,600.

Rajesh Kumar Gautam, the winner in Gurugram and runner-up in Phillaur, now tops the NEXGEN Order of Merit with season's earnings of INR 4,29,600 at the end of the first three events of the season.

Wasim said, "I'm delighted to register my first professional win. I came close to winning

earlier as I had two runner-up finishes on the PGTI Feeder Tour in 2019. I'm glad that I could close out the match this time around.

"My game has been in good shape since last week's event in Kapurthala. So, I just decided to continue with the same game-plan this week and play percentage golf by trying to hit maximum fairways and greens. The advice from my mentor and senior professional Shamim Khan helped me a great deal."
